

WHERE WE ARE

The Boise Valley is located in the Mountain Time Zone and Southwestern Idaho, providing easy non-stop access to all major cities on the West Coast, the Pacific Northwest and Intermountain West. The Boise Metro is home to over 80,000 people and has a labor force of 400,000+ within a 45-minute drive of Boise. The average commute time is 22 minutes.

COMMUTING

The major interstate serving the Boise Valley is I-84, running through the metro area's major cities Boise, Meridian, Nampa and Caldwell, and I-184 branches toward the northeast into downtown Boise. Daily commutes are easy for the Boise Valley's population with federal highways 20, 26, and 30 and state highways 21, 44 and 55 providing access to communities across the Valley. Valley Regional Transit offers public transportation options throughout the Boise Valley.


LOGISTICS

There are 50 motor freight companies serving the Boise Valley, traveling 5 interstates, 20 U.S. highways, and 30 state highways. More than 1,600 miles of rail line through Union Pacific and Burlington Northern Santa Fe provide connection points to Canada, Mexico and the U.S. These rail lines are aided by the State's regional line and six short line railroads. Annually, the rail system transports over 11 million tons of freight.

METRO BREAKDOWN

The **Boise Metro** has seen **significant population growth** over the last decade and projected to surpass 1,000,000 by 2032. Additionally, the age breakdown of the Boise Metro continues to **skew younger** than the population of the United States with about two-thirds of the population under the age of 50.








LABOR FORCE 431,739










*Average housing prices are based on a single-family home newly built and not previously occupied with 4 bedrooms and 2 full baths with approximate size of 2,400 SF on an 8,000 SF lot.

*Apartment rents are based on a unit that is 950SF – 1,050 SF in size with two bedrooms and 1.5 or 2 baths.

*The cost of living is expressed as a composite index score, based on six weighted categories: housing, utilities, groceries, transportation, health care and miscellaneous goods or services. A composite score of 100 is the national average, and any score higher than 100 is above average.



BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Boise State University is the largest University in Idaho. With 790 full-time faculty members, more than 25,000 students, and a choice of over 200 degrees and certificate programs, Boise State is more than just the Bronco Nation.

IDAHO INCENTIVES & TAX OVERVIEW

TAX REIMBURSEMENT INCENTIVE (TRI)

- Up to 30% reimbursement on sales, payroll, and corporate income taxes
- Must create at least 50 jobs in urban area, or 20 in rural area
- Wages must be above county wages
 - Ada County \$64,057
 - o Canyon County \$47,703
- Company must prove the incentive is a critical factor to its decision

IDAHO BUSINESS ADVANTAGE

- Requirements
 - Invest at least \$500,000 in new facilities
 - Create at least 10 new jobs
 - Wages above \$40,000 annually

Benefits

- Enhanced investment tax credit 3.75% on new depreciable, tangible, personal property placed in Idaho during project period
- Real property improvement tax credit of 2.5% on new plant, buildings & structural components that do not qualify for the investment tax credit
- Sales and use tax rebate of 25% on all sales and use tax that the tax payer or contractor actually paid for any property constructed
- o A new jobs tax credit from \$1500-\$3000 for new jobs paying \$24.04/hr
- Local county commissions can exempt all or part of the new investment value from property taxes for a determined period of time

3% INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT

- 3% investment tax credit on all new tangible personal property (machinery and equipment)
- Carryover of 14 years, or a two-year exemption from all taxes on personal property on the qualified investment (can offset up to 50% of income tax liability)

IDAHO SEMICONDUCTORS FOR AMERICA ACT

 Provides qualifying Idaho semiconductor companies with a sales and use tax exemption on the purchase of qualifying construction and building materials

Tax Reimbursement Incentive (TRI)


Companies creating new, high-wage jobs in Idaho can receive up to a 30% reimbursement on sales, payroll and corporate income taxes for up to 15 years. Companies must pay wages above the county average and create at least 50 new jobs in an utran area or 20 iobs in an utran

Idaho Business Advantage

The Idaho Business Advantage incentive package offers an array of tax credits, sales-tax rebates, and property tax exemptions. To be eligible, businesses must invest \$500,000 or more in new facilities and create 10 or more new jobs with salaries averaging \$40,000 a
